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## POISONING: WALLY CAT WANTS YOU TO BE SAFE!

**T**here are many substances around your house that can be poisonous to you! Wally Cat wants you to be very careful when you have a possibly unsafe item in your hands.

### What is a poison?

A poison is something that can be very dangerous if it is used in the wrong way, by the wrong person or in the wrong amount. Many everyday objects used around the house can be dangerous — cleaning products, some medicines, animal bites, spider bites and snake bites.

### How can you get poisoned?

There are many ways that poison can enter your body. You can get poisoned by eating, drinking, touching or smelling an unsafe item. Some poisons like medicine can make you sick if you take the wrong kind, or if you take too much. Always ask a trusted grown-up before you take any medicine. Never put anything in your mouth if you are not sure if it is safe to eat. Ask a grown-up first!



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## Where are poisons found?

Because many poisons can be made from everyday objects in your house, poisons can be found in almost any room. Poisons, such as some plants, berries and mushrooms can also be found outside.

## Preventing poisoning

- If you are not sure what something is, DO NOT put it in your mouth. Always ask a grown-up who you know if it is safe.
- Many medicines have a safety cap on them. Those caps are on the bottle for a reason. If you think you need to take a medicine, be sure to talk to an adult.
- Some plants and berries are poisonous. If you come across a plant or berry that you are unsure about, ask an adult before you put it in your mouth.
- There may be many spray bottles in your house. You should not play with them. Always let an adult use the spray cans or bottles.
- Stay away from chemicals and sprays used to clean your clothes, house or car.



## What can you do if someone gets poisoned?

- Stay calm! If you think you have been poisoned, tell a grown-up right away! They will call the Poison Control Center. The poison center will tell them how to help you.
- If you think your Mom or Dad, your brother or sister or even a friend has been poisoned, tell a grown-up right away. If a grown-up is not close by, you can call the Poison Control Center too!
- Learn the Poison Control Center's phone number. Make sure the number of the poison center is on or near the telephones in your house.

A person who has been poisoned may have different ways of showing it. Symptoms of poisoning will depend on the poison, how much the person was exposed to and for how long. Some poisons have short term effects like a skin rash or vomiting. Other poisons can have long term effects that are very serious such as brain damage or even death.

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
